The Dept. of Veterans Affairs announced that special disaster assistance may be available to Veterans with VA-Guaranteed home loans that have been afected by the recent tornados in Missouri. "We will do everything we can to help Veterans and their families get through this dif ficult time," said Secret ary of VA Eric K. Shinseki. "We urge Veterans to use VA resources available to help them recover from this disaster." VA strongly encourages mortgage companies not to initiate any foreclosures in disaster areas for a period of 90 days. Veterans should contact their insurance company and mortgage companies as soon as possible.

Changes to the **GI Bill**

Just like your DD214 you earned for serving our Country and can never be aken away from you, neither can a diploma you earned for completing your education. On Jan. 4, 2011 President Obama signed the Post-9/1 1 Veteran Educational Assistant Act of 2010. This Act created several changes to the education benefits. Here are a few examples "Monthly housing allowance benefit s are prorated based upon rate of pursuit, rounded to the nearest multiple of 10 (efective Aug. 1, 2011)". "Break or interval p ay is no longer payable under any VA education benefit program unless under an Executive Order of the President or due to an emergency situation such as a natural disaster or strike (effective Aug. 1, 2011)". "Students can be reimbursed for more than one Licensing and certification test, and can also be reimbursed for fees pid to take national exams (effective Aug. 1, 2011)". I joined the Coast Guard in April, 1943 and was sent to Palm Beach, FL for training. I remember when my commander, Dorothy Stratton, got the approval to use the contracted version of our motto, S.P.A.R. (Semper Paratus, Always Ready) an aircraft mechanic. In the Assembly and Repair shop,

SPARS. After training, I volunteered to go to Seattle, but when I received my orders, they were sending me to The Ninth Naval District, which was headquartered in St. Louis. They were sending me home! During my three years at the Ninth Naval District, my responsibilities varied. I enjoyed the fellowship and made

lasting friendships during my time in the Navy and I have no regret s. The Navy presented incredible opportunities for me.

I joined the Coast Guard in May, 1944 while visiting my brother in Boston, who was also in the Coast Guard serving on the USCG Campbell. I did my SPARS boot camp at Palm Beach, FL. After boot camp I went to Yeoman's

to enter the service. My father had strong objections to school and received my first job assignment. I was sent to Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington DC to work labels, but when I turned 21 I signed up. I did my basidin intelligence where I was stuck in a boring job for six training at Fort Des Moines, IA. My assignment s after months. I was transferred to the Aviation Air and Sea Rescue Office. I was logging planes and tracking mechanical issues and occasionally I would get to fly with "hot shot" pilots. I took advantage of military transport war being sent into the United States. One Christmas flights and flew to places like Texas and California. Life became adventurous and I was enjoying my time in the D.C. area going to galleries, concerts, being active with friends. I worked hard but I also played hard. I was one of the SPARS invited to the White House for tea with Mrs. Truman. The First Lady took time to greet each of

us. She was very pleasant and down to earth, a plain lady. I have great memories, pictures, clippings and even my uniform that I can still wear proudly. I would do it all over again if giver the opportunity.

Q. I recently was discharged from the Army where all my medical was provided for me. I would like to still have my yearly women exams. Are these services available to me as a Veteran?

A. Yes, I would highly encourage you to apply for your VA Health Care through the VA. This can be accomplished through several resources. You can fill out a V A Form 10-10EZ located on www.va.gov, call 1-877-222-8381, or call any V A Health Care Facility or V eteran Benefits Office. I would encourage you to visit with the W omen Veterans Program Manager, there is one located at every VA Hospital or visit a Veteran Service Officer and bring your DD214.

Fascinating Facts

During the WWII era 70% of women held "female traditional" jobs such as Nurses, Typists, Clerks and Mail Sorters. These women have paved the way for today's women who are serving in the Armed Forces. Today women serving in our Military are performing jobs such as Truck Drivers, Gunners, Military Police and Pilots. Below are some interesting statistics on how far our military has come for women who are currently serving.

- Women make up 15-20% of the military.
- 95% of military jobs (MOS & AFSC) are now open to women.
- As of October 2010 Missouri had 37,777 women Veterans.
- More than 1.8 million women are Veterans
- 245,000 women Veterans are registered with the Women In Military Service for America Memorial (WIMSA)
- 57,149 of these women Veterans are WWII Veterans, and they are the largest supporter of WIMSA.
